Diabetes can cause severe eye complications, including swelling of the retina (macular edema), abnormal growth of new retinal blood vessels and bleeding inside the eye. Changes in the blood vessels of the retina or fluctuations in vision sometimes lead to the first diagnosis of diabetes. Central retinal artery occlusion (CRAO) should prompt a search for a source of atherosclerosis, emboli or inflammatory causes (eg, giant cell arteritis, GPA, systemic lupus erythematosus, Kawasaki disease and pancreatitis). Systemic arterial hypertension, hemoglobin abnormalities, and arterial macroaneurysms can manifest as various retinal vascular disorders. In some cases, the ophthalmologist

An ocular manifestation of a systemic disease is an eye condition that directly or indirectly results from a disease process in another part of the body. There are many diseases known to cause ocular or visual changes. Diabetes, for example, is the leading cause of new cases of blindness in those aged 20–74, with ocular manifestations such as diabetic retinopathy and macular edema affecting up to 80% of those who have had the disease for 15 years or more. ... Retinal artery occlusion is a significant indicator of systemic disease. 15 All acute cases of retinal artery occlusion warrant immediate referral to a stroke unit for evaluation. It is essential to suspect certain cases of retinal artery occlusions may be caused by giant cell arteritis. Recognizing Abnormal Vasculature Signs of a systemic disease may be evident on the outer surface of the eye (eyelids, conjunctiva and cornea), middle of the eye and at the back of the eye (retina)." patients with AIDS. Antibodies are found in almost 95% of adults, causing a trivial illness in immunocompetent adults, however severe immunosuppression causes viral reactivation and tissue invasive disease.

Systemic disease and the eye Systemic lupus erythematosus can be diagnosed if any four or more of the 11 criteria are present serially or simultaneously, during any interval of observation. In contrast, SLE associated vaso-occlusive disease characterized by widespread capillary non-perfusion of the retina (See Figure 3) has been associated with a worse visual prognosis. systemic diseases also affect the retina. Complications of such systemic diseases include diabetic retinopathy from diabetes, the second most common cause of blindness in the developed world, hypertensive retinopathy from cardiovascular disease, and multiple sclerosis. Retinal Imaging and Image Analysis Atopic keratoconjunctivitis (AKC) is associated with systemic allergic diseases such as environmental allergies, asthma and eczema. It is a chronic type IV hypersensitivity immune inflammatory response with episodes of exacerbation and remission. Chronic AKC can affect the eyelids, conjunctiva, cornea or lens. Corneal Manifestations of Systemic Diseases Angioid streaks are bilateral, narrow, irregular lines

deep to the retina configured in a radiating fashion emanating from the optic disc, which result from breaks in a weakened Bruch's membrane. Ophthalmologists should be aware that there are numerous systemic diseases associated with angioid streaks, the most common being

EyeWiki Diabetes mellitus. Diabetic retinopathy (DR) is leading cause of blindness in 20- 64yo in US.

Duration of DM is directly related to prevalence of retinopathy. After 20 yrs: 99% of type 1 and 60% of type 2 will have some degree of DR.

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
